The subject of this article was a professor of Mechanical Engineering at the University of Illinois in Champaign, author of several books and articles on technical subjects such as thermodynamics. He was also involved with the Big Ten athletic conference as a faculty representative. He relation to the Immigrant Goodenows is unknown at present. DNA Connection to British Goodenoughs Still Eludes Us

The GFA has been unsuccessful in identifying living Goodenow descendants in England, though the Goodenough surname has not disappeared there. The first attempt to find a DNA match was in 2008. Beginning in 2021, another effort was made, spurred by a British couple, of which the wife's maiden name was Goodenough. Alas, the test results of the male Goodenough relative recruited (from an all-male line) matched one of the British lines identified in 2008, but did not match the DNA collected from Goodenows descended from the Immigrants of 1638. Lucene Leonette Goodenow, Artist and Mother of Artists

Lucene Goodenow was the mother of the three artists profiled in the May issue of *Ghosts*, Julian, Girard and Earle Goodenow. She was an artist herself, but was most noted for marrying an American of Japanese descent, Kyōhei Inukai (also an artist), in 1910. Thanks to GFA Life member Dennis Goodno, who reported that the artist named Girard Goodenow was featured on an episode of PBS's *Antiques Roadshow*, for bringing the family's story to light. John Bannister Goodenough: Lithium-Ion Battery Inventor and Nobel Prize Recipient (25 July 1923-25 June 2023) Though not a GFA member (his older brother, Ward Hunt Goodenough, was), John Bannister Goodenough was a giant in the fields of chemistry, physics, engineering and technology. He worked at a research lab at MIT for 24 years, then became a noted professor at Oxford and later at the University of Texas at Austin, working even at 100 years of age. In 2019, at the age of 97, Goodenough received the Nobel Prize for Chemistry, along with two other researchers. He and his wife had no children. Two lines of descent from the Immigrant Thomas. John Bannister Goodenough's Notable Relatives: A Family of High Achievers (Five photographs)

Father: Erwin Ramsdell Goodenough (1893-1965) – professor of History of Religion at Yale; author; father of six children.

Older brother: Ward Hunt Goodenough (1919-2013) professor of Anthropology at the University of Pennsylvania; father of four children.

Younger brother: James Hinchman Goodenough (1926-2021) – publisher, Vice President and Treasurer of Cleworth Publishing; father of four children.

Younger sister: Hester Vanneman Goodenough Caldwell (1928-2018) – educator at the Putney School, Vermont; mother of four children.

Half-sister: Ursula Wiltshire Goodenough – (1943-) professor of Biology; taught first at Harvard, then at Washington University in St. Louis, MO; mother of five children.

Half-brother: Daniel Adino Goodenough – (1944-) professor of Cell Biology at Harvard Medical School.

John Milton Goodenow of Ohio

John M. Goodenow (1782-1838) is listed at the top of the list of Ohio Electors supporting the Democratic Ticket of Martin Van Buren for President and Richard M. Johnson for Vice President, in the election of 1836. Van Buren and Johnson won their first term, but not a second term. Goodenow's life and accomplishments are summarized. Descendant of the Immigrant Capt Edmund Goodenow. (One image)
